he Rotunda Hospital, Dublin, the oldest continuously operating maternity hospital in the world, is delighted to announce that it is the first Dublin maternity hospital to introduce a full electronic health record (EHR) for all newborn babies and women receiving maternity services at the hospital. The Maternal and Newborn Clinical Management System (MN-CMS), a national system which will be implemented in all 19 maternity units across the country will enhance care as all patients will have an electronic record instead of a paper record, allowing clinical record information to be shared with relevant providers of care, as and when required.

Professor Fergal Malone, Master, Rotunda Hospital, said: "We are very proud to announce that the Rotunda Hospital is the first Dublin maternity hospital and the third hospital nationally, to introduce the Maternal and Newborn Clinical Management System (MN-CMS). The Rotunda is the first stand-alone hospital to go completely electronic in terms of its maternity health care records, which has the potential to offer great efficiencies for patients and healthcare providers. We anticipate even further advances in terms of patient safety and satisfaction over and above our existing services. This successful launch is a result of the collaboration, dedication and teamwork of many staff within the hospital, the HSE, Cerner and maternity services nationally."

10th Annual Service



his year the Rotunda celebrated its 10th Annual Service of Remembrance on 19th November at 3pm in the Pro-Cathedral, Marlborough Street, Dublin 1. This service remembers and honours the precious short lives of babies who have died through miscarriage, ectopic pregnancy, fetal anomaly, stillbirth or neonatal death. It also creates a sense of hope for the future in a peaceful and prayerful way.

People who have been recently bereaved, or long ago bereaved, are welcome to attend. We welcome older siblings, rainbow babies, grandparents, aunts, uncles and extended family members. A growing number of families attend annually and many travel long distances. The service is also attended by Chaplains from the main churches, voluntary perinatal bereavement support organisations, members of the Board of Governors, Executive Management Team and many staff members.

The Books of Remembrance are a key feature of the Remembrance Service and were available for viewing after the service. Babies names are entered in the books by request. Requests need to be received by the hospital chaplain by September of any given year to ensure names are entered in time for the service. During the year the Remembrance Books are reserved in the hospital mortuary chapel and families can arrange a private viewing by contacting the hospital Chaplain.

Following the Service each year many who attend join us for light refreshments in the Gresham Hotel. The Rotunda Hospital sees this Remembrance Service as part of our extended care and service to bereaved families. We are extremely conscious that the death of a baby can cause unimaginable grief and can have profound and long lasting effects. Gathering to remember, to honour and to pray is an integral part of our bereavement support.





he Irish Healthcare Awards, 2017 were held on November 16th, in the Mansion House. Two projects from the Rotunda were honoured.

Commended for Public Health Initiative of the Year:

Introducing the Edinburgh Postnatal Depression Scale (EPDS) in the RCSI Group. This initiative developed and delivered an education and training programme to introduce early screening for postnatal depression (PND) using the EPDS to Cavan General Hospital and Our Lady of Lourdes maternity services over a series of workshops delivered by the Rotunda Mental Health team. Since August 2017 there is now a standardised screening programme in place in the RCSI Group, an increase in awareness across health professionals of PND and a care pathway for women that score highly on the EPDS.

Winner of Patient Education Project of the Year (Non-Pharmaceutical):

Providing Lactation Support to Premature babies in Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. The aim of this initiative was the targeted provision of lactation support for mothers of premature babies within the Neonatal Unit to improve provision of mother's own milk (recognised worldwide as "liquid gold") for these vulnerable babies. Mothers were surveyed on their understanding of the importance of breastmilk for their preterm babies. An information pack was prepared and where possible women were visited antenatally. Support was provided to express prenatally, or within the first hour of birth and an education update given to all staff. As a result the timely provision of mother's own milk for preterm babies increased from 32% to 60% over three months.

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Management Team

s we approach the year end we want to say a big thank you for your on-going commitment to safe patient care and your support to the management of the Hospital throughout the year. This year was a particularly busy year especially with all the work involved in preparation for the "Go Live" on the 18th November 2017 of the MN- CMS Maternal and Newborn Clinical Management System.

Rotunda Relocation Project

The Connolly Hospital Development Control planning is in progress and we look forward to working with the HSE and the Department of Health in creating a roadmap for our eventual relocation at the Connolly campus. The EMT will keep staff updated on any other further developments in relation to this project in 2018.

Rotunda Campus Improvements

Planning permission has been received for the three-storey modular build, which will incorporate an extension to the Assessment and Emergency Unit, a new recovery area in theatre, and an upgraded emergency obstetric theatre attached to the delivery suite. The tendering process for the three storey build has commenced with a start date

anticipated for work to begin in April/May. Included in the above tendering process is the refurbishment of the delivery suite. Due to the major works involved in these projects it is expected that there will be disruptions, including to the back carpark during the build. Further details in relation to the development of the project will be notified to staff once a contractor has been agreed and the programme of building works has been put in place.

Work has completed in upgrading Room 19 in pre-natal on the 2nd floor which will allow ultrasound and fetal medicine to administration to relocate into this area. This will allow a complete renovation and expansion of the scanning facility, while at the same time, providing space for four beds from the current NICU to be relocated into a more spacious environment. Essential maintenance work also needs to be undertaken in the main NICU and once the tenders have been received a programme of work will be then be planned. The completion of the installation of the new generator is expected in early December.

Quality and Safety

A patient experience survey was undertaken in June /July and the results are now published on the Rotunda Hospital website. The overall results are extremely positive with 99% of respondents confirming satisfaction with how they were treated, the confidence they had in staff providing their care and recommending the Hospital to a friend or family member.

Earlier in 2017 the HIQA Announced Medication Safety Audit report indicated that the hospital had a well-established medication safety programme in place and that medication safety was prioritised with clear leadership and support from the Management and staff at the hospital.

HR Matters

Work continues to recruit midwifery and nursing staff to support the clinical areas in the hospital. We extend a very warm welcome to the nurses who have recently taken up posts in the NICU and Theatre in addition to the midwives who have joined our staff in 2017. This on-going recruitment drive has had a very positive impact on patient care and staff morale.

Finance/Funding

The HSE funding allocated for 2017 represents a significant increase on the final 2016 allocation and we continue to work with the RCSI Hospitals Group to ensure adequate funding is available to support a safe and high quality service. Although the Rotunda received an increase in its allocation in 2017 it is expected that the Hospital will have a small deficit by year end and we are exploring options with the RCSI Hospitals Group on resolving this. The deficit relates to underfunding for our base costs.

Finally we would like to take this opportunity to wish you, your family and friends a very happy festive season and we look forward to working with you all in 2018.

The 'Octo Project' first began in Denmark in 2013 and has since spread to many

countries around the world. The tentacles of the octopus resemble the umbilical cord and remind babies of being inside the womb. Parents and staff from other units using neonatal octopus report that when premature babies cuddle the octopus they were calmer, less likely to pull on their monitoring and tubing and appeared more comfortable overall.

MN-CMS

Launch of the Maternity and Newborn Clinical Management System

he Maternity and Newborn Clinical Management System (MN-CMS) project has four high level benefits:

1. Improved patient care as a result of better communication, supported decision making and effective planning of care.

2. More effective and efficient recording of information reflecting best standards in documentation.

3. Enhanced clinical audit and research locally as a result of better quality data.

4. Informed business intelligence that will drive local and national management decisions.

Minister for Health, Simon Harris TD, said: "I'm delighted that Ireland's oldest maternity hospital is its newest digitally enabled hospital. This is the latest hospital to be included in the MN-CMS project, following the already successful introduction in Cork University Maternity Hospital and University Hospital Kerry. The electronic health record for mothers and babies was endorsed in the National Maternity Strategy and supports better, safer clinical decision-making and facilitates the provision of a more connected health service delivering improved health outcomes. The roll out of MN-CMS to the Rotunda Hospital marks a very significant development in the delivery of maternity care."

Staff Developments

Children First

he revised Children First: National Guidance for the Protection and Welfare of Children was launched

on Monday 2nd of October, 2017. The guidance is intended to help everyone recognise child abuse and neglect, and to report concerns to the child and family agency, Tusla. The remaining provisions of the *Children First Act 2015*, including mandatory reporting, will commence on Monday 11th December, 2017.

Child Safeguarding Statement

Providers of services to children will be obliged to develop a Child Safeguarding Statement. This is a written statement specifying what service is being provided by the organisation and what procedures are in place to ensure that a child availing of the service is safe from harm. This must be circulated to all staff, displayed publicly and made available to parents, guardians, Tusla and members of the public on request.

What does this mean for the Rotunda?

Currently, the Rotunda Hospital cooperates and shares information, where appropriate, with Tusla in order to determine the best outcomes for children and their families. However, on Monday 11th December, 2017, all registered doctors, midwives, nurses, physiotherapist and social workers in the hospital will become legally obliged to report child protection concerns above a defined threshold of harm to Tusla. The threshold of harm at which you must report to Tusla under the Children's First Act is reached when you know, believe or have reasonable grounds to suspect, that a child has been, is being or is at risk of being neglected, ill treated, assaulted or sexually abused to the point that the child's health, development or welfare have been, are being or are likely to be seriously affected.

Rotunda Staff

As part of our Child Safeguarding Statement, the hospital will have to identify real and potential risks of a child being harmed while using our service and how we manage this risk.

One of the risks is staff not recognising child abuse/neglect and not knowing what to do if they have a concern. To ensure awareness exists, it is now mandatory for all Rotunda staff (permanent, agency, and locum), irrespective of role or grade, to complete the E-learning training module "An Introduction to Children First" available on HSeLanD www.hseland.ie.

The programme takes approximately one

and a half to two hours to complete. The programme will allow you to log back in and resume where you left off over a period of a month. You will receive a certificate of completion directly to your email address, which will be valid for three years.

The Medical Social Work Team

It is everyone in society's responsibility to protect children and to do our best to keep them safe. It is upsetting when we know or hear of children who have been harmed. The medical social work team are available to answer any questions and provide support, if staff encounter any difficulty.


